ike many model railroaders, my journey started with a Christmas train set when I was about 8. Living in England, my train set was a Hornby clockwork 0-4-0 with a couple of wagons (cars), a guard's van (caboose), and a circle of tinplate track about three feet in diameter. As far as I remember, the set's scale was about O scale.

I was right into operations with that first train set — sort of! One of the wagons was open-topped, and my younger brother's an my toy soldiers, who were about G+ scale, rode in the wagon. Starting at one side of the track circle, they traveled several circuits, or until the clockwork spring started to wind down, then arrived and disembarked miles away at the other side of the circle.

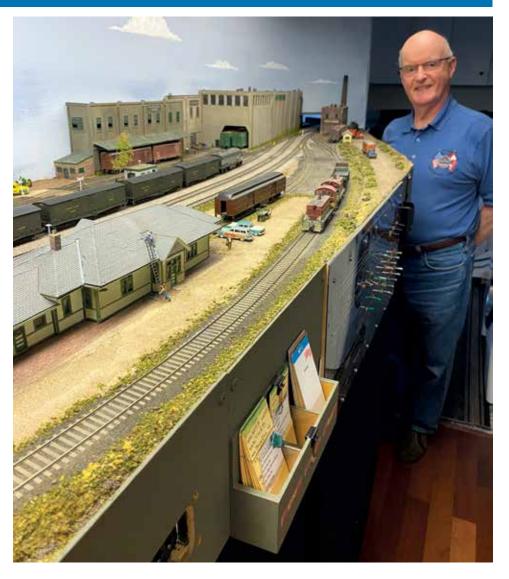
We built a few more British-type layouts over the next 15 years or so.

In the mid-1980s, now living in Canada, I joined the H.O.M.E.S. model railroad club in Hamilton, Ontario. The club members were very welcoming and got me involved in helping to build the club layout right away. I learned many new model railroad skills from the members, including handlaying track, scratchbuilding structures, turnouts, wiring, etc. The club layout used a diode matrix to control turnouts and set specific routes, which fascinated me. So, I built a small layout in my basement, including hand-laid track and turnouts and diode matrix turnout/route controls. The layout worked well, even if somewhat limited in operation — at least the toy soldiers were gone!

When we moved to another house, the layout came with us as one piece, but other life priorities like work and family used up most of my time, and the layout lived in the basement, leaning up against the wall until it was scrapped when we made our next house move.

Encouraged by the members of the H.O.M.E.S. club, I joined the NMRA in 1985: the International Division (ID) of the Niagara Frontier Region. I attended meetings but was not a very active member.

I retired at the end of 2004, and we moved to our current location in the fall of 2005. Layout planning started after the typical house move settling-in period,



with construction beginning in early 2006, and this is my current layout. It represents the Toronto, Hamilton & Buffalo Railway in 1959 with interchanges with the New York Central. It is about 12x25-feet. All visible track and turnouts are hand-laid with several routes programmed using NEC "Switch-8" decoders — much less work than a diode matrix!

I became interested in the Achievement Program at the January 2009 International Division meeting. MMRs Ron Tuff, Dave Paterson, and Craig Webb all gave clinics on improving modeling skills via the AP in various areas of the hobby. This theme really struck a chord with me, and I felt that was exactly what I wanted to do in the hobby. The work I had already done on the layout was sufficient to get the Golden Spike award to get me started.

Following these presentations, Chuck Faist, Past Superintendent of the ID, dis-

cussed establishing a support program for those interested in the AP. I was hooked!

After the meeting, I asked Harvey McIntyre, then ID Superintendent, if I could become more involved in the Division. The Clerk position was open at the time, and he invited me to take it, which I did. This position increased my contribution to the Division, and I also started earning points for the Volunteer certificate.

I served as Clerk for three years. Then, in January 2012, Harvey wanted to step down as Super and suggested I put my name down, which I did, and I was elected Superintendent of the ID. After holding this position for three years, I qualified for the AP "Official" certificate, which I received in 2015. During these first three years as Super, I was on the committee for the ID hosting the 2014 NFR three-day Region convention, the Grapevine Express at Niagara-on-the-Lake. I carried

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on as Super for an additional three years when our current Super, Ron Johnson, was elected at the March 2018 ID meeting.

I wrote several articles that were published in the Region and Division newsletters. I also presented a clinic at the 2012 NMRA National Convention in Grand Rapids, Michigan, on using Microsoft Excel to make control panel graphics. This activity was enough to qualify for the Author certificate. By the end of 2015, I had earned four certificates: Volunteer, Association Official, Model Railroad Engineer – Electrical, and Model Railroad Author.

I "rested" at four for a little while, not intentionally, just because other priorities came up. I worked on several detailed structures, converted my car handling system to Car Card & Waybill, and completed a few other projects.

In 2023, I started to focus on finishing the AP project, which required three more certificates, including either Cars or Locomotives! I worked on the Scenery and Model Railroad Engineer – Civil requirements and qualified for these two certificates by July 2024.

I chose Cars for my seventh certificate. I scratchbuilt four express reefers, which covered the scratchbuilt and the "passenger-train-capable" requirements. And while at it, I made an extra one to serve as one of the four required superdetailed cars. The other three superdetailed cars were a craftsman "box of sticks" kit of a PRR open hopper, a resin kit NYC gondola, and an Athearn boxcar converted to a wood chip car and superdetailed.

I was quite apprehensive about scratchbuilding rolling stock, but with the encouragement and help from fellow modelers, the cars all received merit awards.

The journey to MMR is not one to travel solo, and I had lots of help, advice, and encouragement along the way. During my term as division superintendent, I received great support from the other Division executive members, especially when the ID hosted a Region convention in 2014.

Ron Tuff, MMR, the ID Achievement Program Manager, was always available to advise and give ideas, promptly reply to my many emails, and encourage me to keep motivated and moving forward.

Dave Paterson, MMR, was a great help in interpreting the express reefer prototype drawings and gave me a copy of his very detailed construction notes. During an ID clinic presentation, Dave said that when scratchbuilding something to replicate a prototype, like cars or structures, to get the details right and ask yourself, "How can I make it look like that?" I have this quote printed and pinned to my workshop wall, facing me as I sit at my workbench.

Many other NMRA members have encouraged me and been interested in my success throughout this journey. A big thank you goes to all of them.

And, of course, many thanks to my wife, Susan, for her patience, advice, and encouragement all along the way.

Working through the NMRA Achievement Program has definitely improved my modeling skills, and I look forward to helping and encouraging others to participate.
